2014 CONFERENCE REPORT

Debra Ackerman, Program Co-Chair Julia T. Atiles, Program Co-Chair

We received 152 paper submissions and 16 session proposals. Out of the 152 paper proposals, 83 were accepted and scheduled into 9 paper sessions (n=49), 4 roundtables (n=12), or 2 poster sessions (n=22). Out of the 16 session proposals, we accepted 11. However, just 6 sessions remained as symposia and the additional 5 were placed in roundtables. The end result is that the SIG will be sponsoring a total of 15 paper sessions, 9 roundtables, and 2 poster sessions.

Papers which were accepted all had an average score of 3.2 or above and received "accept" recommendations from at least 2 of the 3 reviewers. In scheduling the paper sessions, we started with the proposals that received 3 accept recommendations and the highest average score. We then worked our way down until all of the sessions were filled.

2014 BUSINESS MEETING Discussion & Reception

Stuart Reifel Recipient of the 2014 Distinguished Contribution to Early Education/Child Development Research Award

Stuart Reifel, this year's winner of the Distinguished Contribution to Early Education/Child Development Research Award, has had a profound impact on the field of Early Education and Child Development over his forty years in the field. Stuart was born in a small-town farming community in Northern California. He earned a baccalaureate degree in Anthropology at Stanford. Given his interest in socialization into culture, Mark Lepper and Eleanor Maccoby steered him toward developmental psychology. Stuart began his career as a teacher in the Bing Nursery School at Stanford University and earned a master's degree from Stanford's Graduate School of Education in 1973. He continued to teach young children until beginning his doctoral work at UCLA. At this time he found himself drawn to the many aspects of play. It is Stuart's extensive and creative study of play that is the hallmark of his reputation.

Stuart was a faculty member at the University of Texas at Austin for 32 years, until his retirement in 2012 and he holds the rank of Professor Emeritus. He held both the W.K. Kellogg Professorship of Community College Leadership (2005-2008) and the Cissy McDaniel Parker Professorship (2008-2012). He served as a leader for both the Early Education/Child Development SIG as chair and the Association for the Study of Play as president. His publications in journals, books, and conference proceedings are numerous. However, numbers alone do not tell the story of how he has influenced both other professionals and scholarship in general in the field through his writing and his mentorship. In particular, the study of play has been shaped by his contributions over time. Long before I met Stuart, I was using his work on block play. He has, through his own meticulous inquiry, challenged all of us to think deeply about children's play across settings, cultures, and time.

Dear Colleagues,

I want to thank the SIG for this remarkable honor. The SIG has been an important scholarly home for me for all my career. To be recognized with this award is heartwarming. When I learned of the award, one of the first people I contacted was my 92 year old mother, who said, "I've always been proud of you; what took THEM so long?" I reminded her that the SIG has honored me in the past with wonderful duties and opportunities.

I am now trying to reflect on my career in new ways, but find that there are so many ways to have satisfying and productive careers in early childhood research. Our needs for knowledge continue, and our contexts evolve beyond classroom practice, family involvement, and teacher education, to new realms of policy, technology, and culture. I think one thing that has distinguished my own career is the way I have been given opportunities, often through contacts in the SIG, to develop projects that have spoken to the field. Collaboration has been key to my work, so I must give smart and focused colleagues full credit for anything that we can call distinguished.

A second aspect of my career that I fully acknowledge is my collaboration with wonderful graduate students. My students have drawn me to interesting phenomena in the field and stoked the flames under new practice, particularly in the area of play. I want to credit those smart and capable students for keeping me moving forward.

My career has been very satisfying. I am grateful for the opportunities and relationships that have kept me going. And I am eternally grateful to the SIG, for providing a place for me to continue my work.

2014 DISSERTATION AWARD

We are pleased to announce that Dr. Lorelei Pisha dissertation research was selected for the 2014 EE/CD SIG Dissertation Award. We had a strong and diverse set of submissions that reflected a commitment and passion to early education and child development. All submissions were reviewed by three independent reviewers. Submissions were scored in the following categories: significance of problem/topic; theoretical framework; method of inquiry/methodology; use of evidence and analysis; depth of analysis and organization of findings; and contribution of the topic to the field of Early Education and Child Development. Reviewers summed their scores, ranked nominees for the award, and then together we discussed the results and came to a consensus.

Dr. Pisha's dissertation is titled, "Teacher Beliefs and Practices Related to Physical Activity in the Preschool Setting: A Phenomenological Investigation." In this work, Dr. Pisha investigates how early childhood teachers working in Head Start programs make meaning of physical activity play for preschool-aged children by exploring these teachers' personal and professional experiences with physical activity play. The findings of her study lead to important implications for promoting evidence-based in young children's physical activity play in inclusive preschools serving diverse children and families.

Congratulations again to Dr. Pisha for this outstanding work!




Dr. Claire Baker was chosen for the 2014 Early Education/Child Development (EE/CD) SIG Early Research Career Award. Dr. Baker is a first year assistant professor in the School of Education at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC-Chapel Hill); prior to this appointment, she completed a one-year postdoctoral fellowship at Duke University and a two-year university wide minority post-doctoral fellowship at UNC-Chapel Hill. Dr. Baker's research focuses on children in low wealth communities and especially the development of African American children and families by using large data sets to answer important questions about minority children. Dr. Lynne Vernon-Feagans, UNC's William C. Friday Distinguished Professor of Early Childhood, wrote persuasively about Dr. Baker as part of the nomination process, "As a post-doctoral fellow she was an indispensable member of our research team as both a leader and thoughtful contributor to our understanding of minority children who live in low wealth rural America. In addition, she has been a mentor to graduate students and junior colleagues because of her advanced knowledge about minority families and her outstanding skills in statistical methods. She is truly remarkable, with more first authored journal articles than any other young scholar I have ever worked with in my career. She deserves this award."

The EE/CD SIG Early Research Career Award is chosen annually from early childhood research scholars within the first five years of earning the doctorate; the award includes a plaque and monetary gift of \$500.

2015 EARLY RESEARCH CAREER AWARD Seeking Applications



We are currently seeking applications for the EE/CD SIG Early Research Career Award. The Early Education/Child Development (EE/CD) SIG of the American Educational Research Association (AERA) annually presents the EE/CD SIG Early Research Career Award. This award is made to an individual with a promising record as a researcher and scholar in the early childhood field, as evidenced through an emerging record of a research agenda, publications, and other scholarly activity.

Candidates for the EE/CD Early Research Career Award are within the first five years of having received their doctoral degree. Recipients of this award receive a monetary award in the amount of \$500 and are invited to present a brief synopsis of their research at the SIG business meeting. Nominations for this award may come from members of the EE/CD SIG. Complete nominations will include the following in ELECTRONIC format (e.g., PDF files):

- 1) A letter from the nominator with specific information justifying the nomination, as well as the current employment status of the nominee;
- 2) A second letter of support for the nomination from anyone in the field of early childhood/child development who can speak to the merits and relevance of the nominee's scholarly activity;
- 3) Recent curriculum vitae with complete bibliographic information on the nominee; and
- 4) Copies of 2 publications representative of the nominee's scholarly contributions to the early childhood/child development field.

If the nominator was the dissertation chair or otherwise closely involved with the candidate's doctoral studies, the second letter of support should come from someone who was not involved in the nominee's doctoral degree program. The second letter does NOT have to come from a SIG member, but must be someone in the field of child development and early childhood education.

2015 OUTSTANDING DISSERTATION AWARD Seeking Applications



Annually, the EE/CD SIG awards the Outstanding Dissertation Award for a recent dissertation of exceptional merit. The recipient will receive a plaque from the SIG and a monetary gift at the EE/CD SIG Business meeting. The recipient also receives an automatic invitation to present the dissertation work as part of the EE/CD Business Meeting.

The criteria for this award are:

- 1) A completed and defended dissertation accepted by the Graduate School of the nominee's university within two years of the deadline for submission.
- 2) A study that investigates a topic related to the development of children between birth and age 8, including studies focused on families, teachers and others who care for and educate young children;
- 3) A nominating professor who is a current member of AERA.

Procedures:

To be considered for the award, please submit the following items by e-mail:

One letter of faculty endorsement from a member of the student's dissertation committee who is an AERA member, attesting that the dissertation was completed by the student during the time period specified and that the faculty member nominating or endorsing the nomination served on the dissertation committee. Please also include the oral defense date. This letter should include a brief clarification of the purposes, scope, and quality of the student's dissertation research, as well as an explanation of how the dissertation contributes to the field of early childhood, child development, or early education.

A title page for the dissertation (including university/college, name of the professor chairing the dissertation committee and a complete list of committee members). In addition, please add to the title page complete contact information (postal and e-mail) of either the student or the nominator that can be used for all correspondence regarding the award.

The Table of Contents from the dissertation.

- A journal-length manuscript summarizing the study derived from the dissertation and written by the nominee. This manuscript should adhere to the APA manual's (5th ed.) guidelines for manuscript preparation, should be approximately 25-30 pages (double-spaced), and should be geared toward publication. The summary should include: objectives/purpose; perspectives/theoretical framework; methods/mode of inquiry; data sources and analyses; results/discussion; and conclusion and educational/scientific importance of study. The summary should advance the scholarly publication potential of the research and will be judged primarily by a panel of scholars in the field and former dissertation winners.
- A 1-2 page summary (abstract) of the study to be published in the SIG newsletter should the award be given to the recipient.




